# Music development plan summary: OLSP

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

#### Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

The aims of our Music curriculum are to develop pupils who:

- Can sing and use their voices individually and in a group
- Create and compose music on their own and with others
- Use technology appropriately when composing
- Have opportunities to learn a musical instrument
- Understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated
- Listen to, review and evaluate the work of great composers and musicians from a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions
- Enjoy and have an appreciation of a range of different musical styles e.g. Classical,
  Jazz, Hip Hop, Pop, Rock etc.
- Use and understand musical language and include musical features in their own work
- Make judgements about the quality of music
- Have opportunities to play a wide variety of instruments
- Have different opportunities to take part in performances

Children at OLSP are taught by a specialist music teacher, Stuart Hopkins, who has each class for an hour per week. Children learn a variety of instruments during this time, such as a variety of percussion, recorders, ukulele and guitar, as well as developing their singing skills. Children have the opportunity to practise and learn each instrument over a number of weeks, but lessons also include time for performances and recording using chromebooks and/or tablets. Children are also taught how to read music.

#### Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

OLSP has a number of peripatetic music teachers that come into school on various days. Instruments offered include piano, guitar and drums. There are opportunities for children who learn instruments outside of lesson time to perform to the school during assemblies.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

At OLSP, there are weekly singing assemblies where children practise a number of seasonal hymns and songs. They also listen to music when entering and departing the hall for other assemblies.

Regular concerts and performances are held to give children the opportunity to showcase their musical skills.

Music grants (such as the MEG) are used to provide workshops for the children when possible. In July 2024, all of the children in KS1 and KS2 were given a 1 hour workshop (per class) to learn a samba performance.

The school work with the community where possible and take part in events to support the Teignmouth Classical Music Festival. We have classical musicians that visit to demonstrate various instruments.

We have also been involved in composition work with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, and supported music recitals performing alongside members of South Devon Singers Choir.

## In the future

- Long term we would like to establish a school choir (once numbers build).
